1. **CALL TO ORDER**

Chair Dill called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m.

2. **LATE ITEMS**

The following late items were introduced:

1. Added to agenda Item **9. WORK PLAN ITEMS**, 1. Heritage Register (b) List of Properties, Places and Items (For Completing Statement of Significance For)
 - i. 321 Plaskett Place
2. Added to agenda Item **9. WORK PLAN ITEMS**, 7. Memorial Park

3. **APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA**

Moved by Colin MacLock, seconded by Councillor Hundleby that the agenda of the Heritage Advisory Committee meeting of February 16, 2011 be approved as amended.
The motion **CARRIED**.

4. **MINUTES**

Moved by Vice Chair Sudbury, seconded by M. Duncan that the minutes of the Heritage Advisory Committee meeting of January 19, 2011 be approved as presented.
The motion **CARRIED**.

5. **REPORT FROM THE CHAIR**

Chair Dill updated the Committee on recent communications with John Aldag from Parks Canada. He is proceeding with contacting persons at the federal and provincial level.

He noted that the province is interested in providing assistance with heritage initiatives where there are cross-jurisdictional issues. He also noted that there is interest in recognizing Major James Peters as a person of national significance. Mr. Aldag will have more information available for the March meeting.

While on the subject of military recognition, it was noted by a committee member that they wanted to expand upon a point in the January 19, 2011 meeting minutes. On page 5, under item 9. Work Plan Items 2011, it states that “there is desire to include the heritage of DND persons, places and events; however, the DND is a separate entity and as such its buildings are not within our jurisdiction”. It was noted that this fact does not preclude the Committee from maintaining an interest in the DND and its buildings nor from creating Statements of Significance for DND buildings.

6. SPECIAL GUEST

(1) Rick Goodacre – Heritage BC

Rick Goodacre thanked the Committee for the opportunity to speak about Heritage BC and the effect of recent provincial funding cuts. He congratulated the Committee on the full page article in the Times Colonist highlighting Heritage Week in Esquimalt and for its relevance to this year’s Parks and Cultural Landscapes theme. He distributed Heritage Week Posters, the Heritage BC Quarterly newsletter, the “Heritage Legacy Fund – the First Five Years” booklet and Heritage BC Stops of Interests rack cards.

Mr. Goodacre presented some background information on Heritage BC:

- Is a non-profit organization representing 165 members in BC
- Heritage BC ran the B.C. Heritage Trust program which was established in 1977; in 2003 the program was terminated and the Heritage Legacy Fund of BC Society was instated to take over the community support role of providing grants
- The Heritage Legacy Fund has offered advice and assistance on local heritage issues and has issued 2 million in grants over the last few years, with the next round slated for May

The “A Call to Renew British Columbia’s Heritage Program” campaign began in the fall of 2009 in response to a 100% cut from provincial and gaming funds, which effectively shut the program down. Heritage BC made the difficult decision to use Heritage Legacy Fund monies to get back to work but this has reduced the funds available for supporting community heritage projects.

Local governments now hold all the responsibility for heritage since the BC Heritage Branch lost its funding for programs. However, the supports for municipalities to do this are being taken away, and cities are not able to carry the loss of monies. Only provincially owned heritage sites are still receiving some funding.

Mr. Goodacre has made presentations to several municipalities in BC to speak about the campaign, which intends to:

- Educate communities that this is not an issue only affecting Heritage BC but one that concerns local governments and communities across the province as municipalities are legislated to protect BC’s heritage
- Make the provincial government understand that they have a legislative and political responsibility to provide funding for heritage

Mr. Goodacre asked the Committee to consider making a resolution to take to Council to support the “A Call to Renew British Columbia’s Heritage Program” campaign. To date there have been 36 letters sent to the government indicating support from municipalities and a number of architects.

Councilor Hundleby noted that Council would require a separate memo from the Chair as a resolution. Mr. Goodacre will provide a resolution template, Chair Dill will write the content of the memo, and the Recording Secretary will format it.

Moved by Colin MacLock and seconded M. Duncan, that the Committee recommend to Council to lend support to the “Call to Renew British Columbia’s Heritage Program”.
The motion **CARRIED**.

It was suggested that Mr. Goodacre make a presentation to Council the evening that the recommendation is presented to Council; Mr. Goodacre was welcome to the idea.

Mr. Goodacre thanked the Committee and departed at 7:45 pm.

7. OLD BUSINESS

- (1) Heritage Certificate of Recognition Awards
 - (a) 2011 Awards

Chair Dill noted a small piece in the Times Colonist advertising the 2011 awards. It was noted the deadline was set for March 16 and the application information is on the website. Chair Dill reconfirmed with Vice Chair Sudbury that he would assist with making the certificates again as the Committee was pleased with last year’s design.

- (2) Terms of Reference – Heritage Advisory Committee, No. Admin 50 – revised January 17, 2011

It was noted that the Terms of Reference were revised with the addition of the following:

- All communications from the Committee are to represent the Corporation of the Township of Esquimalt
- A youth representative member position

- (3) 2010 Year End Final Report

The 2010 Work Plan and the 2009 Year End Report were distributed as a reference point along with the 2011 draft Year End Report.

The 2010 Activities and Accomplishments for 2010 report (draft Year End Report) was presented to the Committee for approval.

A member suggested that the Certificates of Recognition will be referred to as ‘individualized’ instead of ‘individual’.

Moved by Vice Chair Sudbury, seconded by Colin MacLock that the ‘2010 Activities and Accomplishments for 2010’ summary be accepted for the ‘2010 Year End Final Report’ and presented in a memorandum to Council.
The motion **CARRIED**.

- (4) Designating undesignated portion of Memorial Park and adding trees to the Heritage Register

Chair Dill reported that Barb Snyder, Staff Liaison, discussed the possibility of designating the undesignated portion of Memorial Park with the Director of Parks and Recreation. At this time Parks and Recreation is not interested in pursuing a joint project for this purpose; there was an indication that future plans may be in the works and the trees in question may not be healthy. Ms. Snyder recommended that Chair Dill speak to the Director directly for more information as she will be away.

The Committee discussed the trees and the designation of the undesignated portion:

- It was noted that what is important is the plaques and keeping the sentiments and thoughts of the memorial trees in perpetuity, i.e. who planted them and why
- These trees are not on the heritage register; they would need to be assessed by an arborist as a first step
- The concern was expressed that if the park is not designated in its entirety it would leave it open to development; however, it was noted that it can not be developed as the park is protected by the park resolution bylaw
- It was noted that the last surveying post for the municipality of Esquimalt is located in the park and this fact could allow the whole square to be designated

Chair Dill would like to gather more information before the Committee decides whether to pursue either motion. She suggested revisiting the original idea of adding the trees to the Heritage Register and determining whether the trees are worthy of being added to the Heritage Tree register. The first step would be to determine their condition, life expectancy, etc. with assistance from Parks.

Moved by Sherri Robinson and seconded by Vice Chair Sudbury that the Committee ask Parks and Recreation to explore whether there are possible additions of trees in the undesignated portion of the park that can be added to the Heritage Tree Register. The motion **CARRIED**.

Councillor Hundleby volunteered to follow-up with this action item.

- (5) Letter from Clare Sharpe, CFB Esquimalt Naval and Military Museum, dated January 18, 2011, re: Heritage Week 2012 activities - discussion

Chair Dill reported that she and another member met with Clare Sharpe in December, the outcome being a proposal for a special weekend at the museum which would be free and open to the community, and which would feature Heritage Week as part of the 2012 Centennial Celebrations. The Committee committed to help promote the event as a joint project and Chair Dill will communicate this intention Ms. Sharpe.

It was noted that Ms. Sharpe has contacted the Dockyard to ask if the Committee can be given a tour of the Dockyard.

8. NEW BUSINESS

- (1) 2011 Work Plan

Chair Dill requested that members refer to the 2010 Work Plan that was distributed.

Each item was discussed for changes or amendments:

Item 1. *Heritage Register*

The following changes were requested:

- Remove the addresses as this list is frequently updated
- Add a second bullet – 'Maintain an ongoing list of priority sites'

Item 2. *Update Heritage Policies*

No changes proposed. It was noted that Donald Luxton will combine relevant heritage policies and documents into one attachment.

Item 3. *Creation of a Heritage Foundation*

It was noted the Committee has not applied for funds from Heritage BC, though this option may not be possible due to the Centennial Committee having applied already.

Councillor McIlldoon noted that there is a matching grant for refurbishing memorial plaques with a five year time frame. If the Committee pursued this it would need to be budgeted into funds by Council.

It was noted that provincial grants were explored last year, however there is still a need to pursue concrete actions. There was consensus that the Committee wishes to follow through with creation of a Heritage Foundation.

The Committee decided that item 6. *Research Possible Sources of Funding/Grant Opportunities* would be moved under item 3. *Creation of a Heritage Foundation* as they are related.

Item 4. *Participate in BC Heritage Week*

No changes proposed.

Item 5. *Maintain/Increasing Public Awareness of the Importance of Heritage*

No changes proposed.

Item 6. *Research Possible Sources of Funding/Grant Opportunities*

Moved under Item 3.

It was noted that the original 2009 Work Plan was based on the Heritage Context Plan.

Chair Dill noted that four items were determined as a high priority based on what was discussed at the previous night's heritage policy meeting.

Moved by M. Duncan and seconded by Colin MacLock that the 2011 Work Plan be forwarded to Council.

The motion **CARRIED**.

9. **WORK PLAN ITEMS**

(1) Heritage Register

- (a) Plaques, Monuments and War Memorials

It was noted that the Committee would like to send a card to Jim MacMillan-Murphy.

(b) List of Properties, Places and Items (For Completing Statement of Significance for)

i. 321 Plaskett Place (**Late Item**)

It was recommended that 321 Plaskett Place, a 1941 home, be added to the priority list.

It was recommended that the stone survey marker that marked the corner for the district of Esquimalt, at Drake Avenue and Park Terrace, also be added to the list.

(c) Progress of Statements of Significance (SOS) and Timelines

- 429 Lampson St

It was noted at the policy meeting of February 15 that Donald Luxton is working with this property and as part of that development he would be preparing an SOS. Tabled to the next meeting.

- Work Point Guard House

The Committee recommended using "Guard House" as opposed to "Guardhouse" and to include the honours of the people listed in the document. Other corrections were suggested by Committee. It was noted that Pam Copely is also reviewing the draft for accuracy.

Moved by Councillor Hundleby and seconded by Vice Chair Sudbury that the Work Point Guard House draft be added to the Community Heritage Register.

The motion **CARRIED**.

- 1214 Old Esquimalt Road

Moved by M. Duncan and seconded by Kara Ronse that 1214 Old Esquimalt Road be included on the Community Heritage Register.

The motion **CARRIED**.

- 704-3 Rockheights Ave

Moved by Colin MacLock and seconded by M. Duncan that 704-3 Rockheights Ave be included on the Community Heritage Register.

The motion **CARRIED**.

- 1209 Lyall St.

This address is the last remaining storefront in Esquimalt.

Moved by Colin MacLock and seconded by Kara Ronse that 1209 Lyall St. be included on the Community Heritage Register.

The motion **CARRIED**.

- It was suggested that the Committee adopt a standardized format for the SOS's
- Chair Dill noted that the drafts must be word-smithed outside of the meeting, in order to respect meeting limitations
- It was also suggested that more information be included in the SOS's, however it was noted as per Donald Luxton that an SOS can be created with a single statement
- It was noted that the Committee will wait until all the SOS's are in their complete draft

form before being presented as a package for Council

(2) Updating Heritage Policy

Chair Dill reported that the Committee held a successful meeting the previous night. The next heritage policy meeting will be held on Thursday, March 31 at 7 pm in the Wurtele Room and will be attended by Donald Luxton.

Their original plan was to lay bricks in a heritage designated area; however, as this is prohibited they have been apprised of other options such as the walkway leading to the designated area. Bruce Devitt from the Centennial Committee will attend a future HAC meeting to request the Committee's approval of the project.

Councillor Hundleby referred to a tour she took last year of the Morley Soda Factory "re-gentrification project". Vice Chair Sudbury offered to download the CD for members.

A member distributed pamphlets for Victoria's Old Cemeteries tours.

13. NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Heritage Advisory Committee will take place on Wednesday, March 16, 2011 at 7 p.m. in the Council Chambers.

The next additional meeting to discuss heritage policy will take place on Thursday, March 31, 2011 in the Wurtele Room. The Recording Secretary will ensure that members receive a hard copy of final draft policy in advance.

SUBJECT: HERITAGE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS
IN 2010

The Terms of Reference for the Heritage Advisory Committee (the "Committee") state that the Committee "will submit to Council a final report at the end of each year describing its activities and accomplishments of the previous year."

In January 2010 Committee members were appointed and at the first meeting in January the elections of the Chair and Vice-Chair were held. This report sets out the Committee's activities and accomplishments from January 2010 to December 2010.

The Heritage Advisory Committee has continued to be productive during the 2010 term. Members have actively contributed to the success of the Committee, building on the work of the previous year.

The six goals established in 2009 were modified to create the 2010 Work Plan:

- Work with volunteers to prepare statements of significance (SOS) to include on the Heritage Register
- Update heritage policies
- Create a heritage foundation
- Participate in BC Heritage Week
- Maintain/increase public awareness of the importance of heritage
- Research possible sources of funding

The Committee held nine regular meetings in 2010. During this time they:

- Approved the first SOS for a home to be included on the newly established Heritage Register
- Created displays at City Hall and the Recreation Centre on local sports history for Heritage Week
- Researched, published and distributed "Esquimalt Remembers", a history of the Navy in Esquimalt in honour of the Naval anniversary; accomplished through the work of Jim MacMillan Murphy
- Re-established the Heritage Recognition Awards, presenting five certificates to deserving (and appreciative) homeowners. Individualized certificates were designed and created by members of the Committee

- Updated heritage information on the Township's website and prepared regular columns in the "Esquimalt Current" with the assistance of Communications Coordinator, Ritchie Morrison
- Hosted and participated in a tour of Workpoint and Macaulay Point and met with John Aldag, Historic Sites Manager, Parks Canada, to discuss our interest in the heritage value of these properties
- Ordered the production of six heritage plaques for designated heritage homes
- Prepared a plaque to commemorate Floyd Joseph's artwork in the Wurtele Room
- Prepared a list of plaques, monuments and memorials to be included on the Heritage Register, and began researching information for SOS's
- Toured the Naval and Military Museum and met with Claire Sharpe, Administrative Assistant, to discuss options for collaborative activities
- Sent a representative to the Heritage B.C. conference held in Victoria
- Prepared draft SOS's for six sites to be included on the community Heritage Register
- Continued preparations for the establishment of an Esquimalt Heritage Foundation, including hosting members of the Victoria Heritage Foundation and researching constitutional and financial implications
- Carried over funds to allow for the contracting of Donald Luxton and Associate to update Esquimalt's heritage policy

In addition to these specific activities the Committee has continued to identify and support the preservation of buildings and sites of historic value to Esquimalt. The Committee, with two additional members, looks forward to carrying on its work in 2011.

SUBJECT: REQUEST TO SUPPORT BC'S HERITAGE PROGRAM

Recommendation: The Heritage Advisory Committee (HAC) recommends to Council to lend support to "A Call to Renew British Columbia's Heritage Program" and endorse the five recommendations identified in this summary: *Adopt a Provincial Heritage Strategy, Restore the Heritage Branch Budget, Resolve the Heritage Properties Question, Restore Community Support and Invest in the Heritage Legacy Fund.*

Background: At the February 16, 2011 meeting of the HAC we heard a presentation from Rick Goodacre, Executive Director of Heritage BC and resident of Esquimalt. The purpose of Mr. Goodacre's presentation was to update us on government funding cuts to heritage programs in BC, to outline the impact of these cuts on local communities like Esquimalt, and to request support of BC's Heritage Program. Mr. Goodacre will make a presentation at the March 7, 2011 meeting of Council regarding the "A Call to Renew British Columbia's Heritage Program" campaign.

The HAC can benefit greatly in assisting the municipality to achieve its heritage conservation goals through the staff, financial resources, programs and services of Heritage BC and the BC Heritage Branch.


Strategic Plan Alignment: Recognizing the strong commitment that the Township of Esquimalt has to heritage as indicated by inclusion in the Strategic Plan:

'Esquimalt's heritage is an important component of our community and Council wants to identify and protect Esquimalt's significant heritage resources' through the following actions: 'Develop management programs to identify, conserve and interpret heritage resources' and 'Implement heritage conservation programs'.

The City of Victoria urges the Province of British Columbia to renew its commitment to heritage conservation in the following manner:

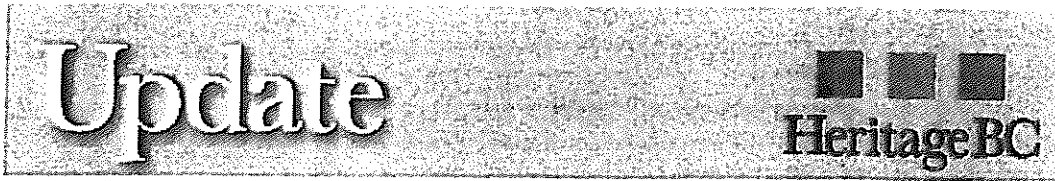
1. Invest a further \$10 million in the **Heritage Legacy Fund**.

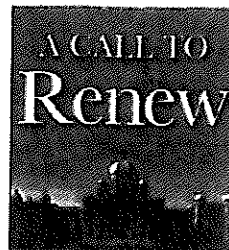
George Abbott Responds to 'A Call to Renew'

Liberal leadership candidate George Abbott has come out with a firm commitment to Heritage BC and the Heritage Legacy Fund. The commitment was contained in a news release on February 18.



Mr. Abbott said, as Premier, he will make strategic investments to support British Columbia's network of local heritage organizations. Specifically, he commits to:

- Tripling the Heritage Legacy Fund endowment to \$15 million within the next three years to support more grants to local heritage pursuits as well as provide stable funding for Heritage BC; and
- Engaging the heritage community to establish a strategy to ensure the ongoing integrity and sustainability of devolved Provincial Heritage Properties across the province, including sites such as Fort Steele, Barkerville, and Emily Carr House.



Abbott previously announced his intention to restore community gaming grants and eligibility to 2008/09 levels. Together, these measures respond directly to the five action items identified in Heritage BC's campaign, 'A Call to Renew British Columbia's Heritage Program'.

Heritage BC will be asking the other Liberal leadership hopefuls if they are prepared to make a similar commitment.

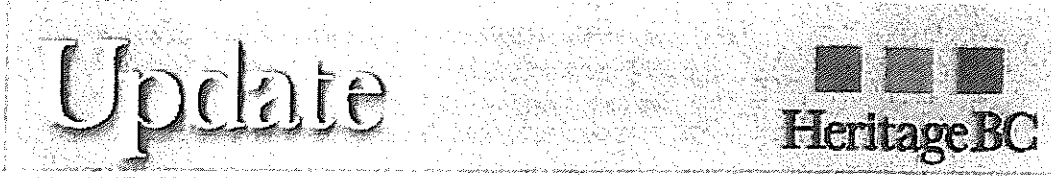

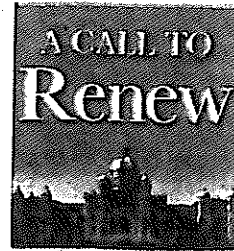

Clark Responds to Abbott's Stand on Heritage

A news release last week by Liberal leadership candidate George Abbott announced his intention, as premier, to support the Heritage Legacy Fund and Heritage BC (see Update February 21). We then asked the other candidates for their response, and received the following from Christie Clark:



"I think George has some very good ideas around heritage conservation. While I'm not able to make promises around funding increases at this time, I do believe we should be supporting Heritage BC and working with local community organizations to preserve, protect and promote our world-renowned historic assets.



Heritage is a key component of my tourism strategy; along with our majestic scenery and world class recreation opportunities, heritage sites such as Barkerville are part of what we market to the world as the B.C. experience. I want to bring together successful commercial players, non-profit and community-based tourist organizations to set up a new market-driven regime that will implement a B.C. Tourism Strategy, which will be supported by government and have predictable funding. We'll work actively with industry players to promote our province as a destination for both holiday travelers and convention-goers from around the world. This includes working more closely with Ottawa around open skies and improved border services for visitors, eliminating fees in provincial parks to encourage families to explore B.C. parks, and vigorously championing emerging areas in the industry like eco-tourism and aboriginal tourism.

And key (to) this strategy is preserving our historic sites so they will continue to be a source of education and inspiration for future generations."
