1. **CALL TO ORDER**

Chair Dill called the meeting to order at 7:07 p.m.

2. **LATE ITEMS**

The following late item was introduced:

1. Added to agenda Item 5. **SPECIAL GUEST**, Bruce Devitt – Centennial Committee

3. **APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA**

Moved by Sherri Robinson, seconded by Kara Ronse that the agenda of the Heritage Advisory Committee meeting of March 16, 2011 be approved as amended.
The motion **CARRIED**.

4. **MINUTES**

Moved by Colin MacLock, seconded by M. Duncan that the minutes of the Heritage Advisory Committee meeting of February 16, 2011 be approved as presented.
The motion **CARRIED**.

5. **SPECIAL GUEST**

- (1) Bruce Devitt – Centennial Committee (**Late Item**)

Chair Dill welcomed Bruce Devitt. Mr. Devitt provided some background information on the Centennial Brick Walkway initiative:

- Project was conceived in 2009 and Memorial Park was selected for its installation

- Residents can purchase brick pavers and have them inscribed. Messages are to be 'inclusive' and may commemorate anything to do with Esquimalt: veterans, pioneers, businesses, residents, etc. Small pavers are \$100, large pavers are \$200
- The current asphalt walkway is in disrepair; the pavers are more tree-root friendly and will improve safety and accessibility
- The space could hold up to 30,000 pavers. To make the project worthwhile they would need to sell about 1000-1500 with a ratio of 60% small and 40% large pavers. Sold 49 in 2010, and another 22 pavers to date this year.
- Walkway design will depend on number of bricks sold. A map outlining the proposed design was circulated. It was noted that there will be plain pavers around the centograph as this area is already a memorial site.

Mr. Devitt asked that the Committee help spread the word about the project.

Mr. Devitt requested a recommendation from the Committee as to which permit would be appropriate to submit: a 'heritage alteration permit' or an 'update and maintenance permit'.

Barb Snyder, Staff Liaison, noted that the protocol for changes to a heritage designated area is to bring the proposal to this Committee, who then makes a recommendation to Council.

It was noted that Parks has already been informed and has discussed the future maintenance of bricks.

The Committee supports established memorial/military protocol that no marked pavers will be placed around the centograph.

Moved by Councillor Hundleby and seconded by Sherri Robinson that the Committee recommend to Council that a heritage alteration permit for Memorial Park be issued for the express purpose of the creation of the Centennial Brick Walkway, until the completion of the project.

The motion **CARRIED**.

Barb Snyder will draft the memo to Council and ensure the Committee receives a copy of the walkway design map once the alteration permit has been received.

Bruce Devitt departed at 7:35 p.m.

6. REPORT FROM THE CHAIR

Chair Dill reported that heritage is again under new provincial direction. The new ministry is called Ministry of Forests, Lands, and Natural Resource Operations and the minister is the Honourable Steve Thomson.

Chair Dill also requested that members ensure all agenda items are forwarded to Barb Snyder and herself for agenda planning purposes.

7. OLD BUSINESS

- (1) 2010 Year End Final Report – February 22, 2011 memo to Council

Councillor Hundleby noted that the memo was received with positive comments towards the Committee's achievements in 2010.

- (2) 2011 Work Plan – addition

Chair Dill noted that there was a change to the 2011 Work Plan: Heritage Certificates of Recognition were added under Item 5, Increasing Public Awareness. The Committee accepted the addition.

A member noted here that the Esquimalt Archives has gained a new volunteer who is resuming a project started 20 years ago of photographing every house in Esquimalt. It is expected it will take a number of years to complete.

It was noted that Council and the Communications Coordinator should be apprised so that they can field inquiries if needed. It was also noted the project will be posted on the Archives website page. However, members were concerned that this information be placed in a more prominent position on the website.

- (3) Communications with John Aldag

Chair Dill made reference to John Aldag's email from Richard Linzey indicating the Heritage Branch's interest in partnering on multi-jurisdictional issues, and asked the Committee how it wished to proceed. The ensuing discussion brought up the following topics:

- Concerns over who will pay for expenses, upgrades, etc. A member recommended asking Parks and Recreation for the costs associated with the bank stabilizing at Macaulay Point, to help inform the discussion
- SOS's are the first step as they indicate what is worth saving

The consensus was that it is worth pursuing and initiating a discussion, but to proceed cautiously. Chair Dill will initiate a conversation on the telephone to indicate the Committee's interest in multi-jurisdictional issues.

Barb Snyder, Staff Liaison, will ask for the information from Parks regarding costs at Macaulay Point.

- (4) Memorial Park

Councillor Hundleby requested information about the undesignated trees from Parks and Recreation and is waiting for a response.

- (5) Dockyard Tour

The Committee was in favour of attending a daytime tour of the dockyard. Chair Dill will contact them for potential dates in April or May. Members requested a Saturday option so that Council committee members can attend and that the tour be accessible-friendly.

- (6) Council Resolution re: Request to Support BC's Heritage program (A Call to Renew BC's Heritage Program)

Rick Goodacre attended the Council meeting to make a presentation about the program and the resolution was endorsed by Council. A letter in support of renewing the program was sent to the Minister of Tourism with a copy to the premier-designate and Heritage BC. The letter to UBCM in the form of a resolution is being drafted.

8. **NEW BUSINESS**

There was no new business.

9. **WORK PLAN ITEMS**

- (1) Heritage Register

- (a) Plaques, Monuments and War Memorials

1217 Lyall Place was added to the priority list.

Members will keep a copy of the prioritized list distributed at the March meeting and keep track of new properties as they are added, to cut down on paper distribution.

- (c) Progress of Statements of Significance (SOS) and Timelines

- (i) 429 Lampson St

The Committee is waiting for further input. Tabled to the next meeting.

- (ii) Community Heritage Register (four addresses to be added) and next steps

The Committee indicated it would like the format of the SOS's to be standardized for presentation to Council. David Sudbury will be formatting the documents; Barb Snyder, Staff Liaison, will draft the Council memo of addresses to be added to the Heritage Register.

Committee members noted they need clarification to whether heritage status applies to the entire outside of the building or the façade only.

Once Council approves the SOS's they go to the Province and then the owner, with copies to the Archives house file. It was noted that Council should be apprised that there is a legal requirement for the owner to receive a copy. The Recording Secretary will send out letters to notify the owners once the SOS's have been approved.

It was noted that the SOS's are a learning process and that the Committee should consider creating a 'how-to guide' for creating SOS's.

(iii) Standardized format for SOS's

Discussed above.

(2) Updating Heritage Policy

The time of the heritage policy workshop has changed and will now be held from 7:30 – 9:30 p.m. Chair Dill requested that members who are unable to attend send their feedback of the second draft in advance for review at the meeting.

(3) Heritage Foundation Development

(a) Developing a constitution

David Sudbury has been in contact with Donald Linge; they hope to set up a meeting with Steve Barber in the next month.

(b) Establishment of a trust fund

(4) 2012 Centennial Celebration

(a) Possible joint project with Parks and Recreation

The Committee discussed two ideas for potentially collaborating with Parks and Recreation:

- The Saxe Point House willed to the Township has been rezoned as park and is the responsibility of Parks and Recreation. The Committee suggested creating an SOS for this address. Barb Snyder, Staff Liaison, has spoken with the Director of Parks and Recreation and noted there is a requirement to recognize the family of the donator.
- Update the Heritage Tree Policy. The Policy is under the responsibility of Parks. It was noted that the original Heritage Tree Register was completed a number of years ago. The Committee suggested that the Esquimalt Centennial could be part of future memorial plaques. The Committee will wait for feedback from Parks.

(5) Maintaining Public Awareness

(a) *Esquimalt Current*

Chair Dill reported that the publication of the *Esquimalt Current* was delayed and so the 2011 Awards article would not be published before the awards submission deadline. However, the Communications Coordinator has added a notification to the Township website.

(b) Heritage Certificate of Recognition 2011 Awards.

To date there have been no nominations, so Chair Dill asked the Committee for suggestions of addresses to be considered.

The Committee suggested:

- The 'old schoolhouse' float home in Hidden Harbour
- 2 large houses in Hidden Harbour
- House across from Bullen Park (Flannagan's - brown house with white trim)
- House on Lyall Street that has been fixed up
- A member noted a house that may have received an award a long time ago – they will double check with the owner

Chair Dill and Barb Snyder will take photos of these houses; members should email more suggestions to Chair Dill.

Members also proposed the following ideas for the 2012 awards:

- Display a sample Certification of Recognition to promote the 2012 awards
- Recognize homes built in 1912 or earlier

10. REPORT FROM STAFF LIAISON

Barb Snyder, Staff Liaison, reported that the Memorial Park tree recommendation was sent to Parks; also that the 2010 and 2011 Heritage BC membership fees have been paid.

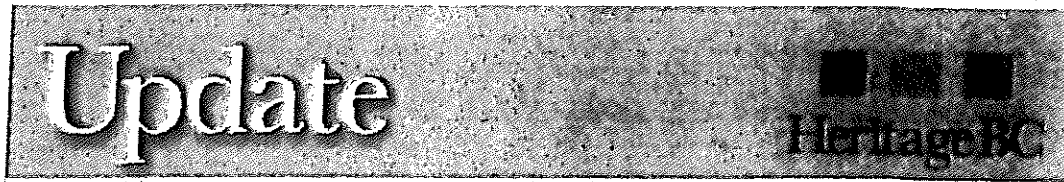

Federal Budget Has Nothing For Heritage

Federal finance minister Jim Flaherty's March 22 budget took a cautious approach to new spending and included nothing for heritage.



In general, the Conservatives have not been very friendly toward heritage over the past five years. They effectively terminated the highly important Historic Places Initiative, and a plan to explore the creation of a new National Trust announced in the 2008 budget has gone nowhere. The National Historic Sites cost-sharing program which has provided \$8 million in infrastructure funding to a select group of heritage resources over the past two years has not been continued in the new budget.

The Heritage Canada Foundation noted two items that were conspicuous by their absence. There was no sign of the long-sought tax incentive for private sector investment in heritage property which, according to HCF executive director, Natalie Bull, "...would have been a good fit with this budget, with its emphasis on jobs, economic growth and quality of life".

Heritage Canada was also disappointed at the lack of any seed money to help transfer hundreds of lighthouses, listed as surplus last year by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans, into the hands of communities, as provided under the new Heritage Lighthouse Protection Act.

The budget did include \$400 million in additional funds for the ecoEnergy Retrofit-Homes project, providing up to \$5,000 per unit to improve energy efficiency. This program, however, is a double-edged sword which can be a threat to the heritage character of older homes if used indiscriminately to replace doors and windows with inappropriate new units.

Re: **Heritage Alteration Permit – Memorial Park - Centennial Memorial Walkway**

At the March 2011 meeting, the Heritage Advisory Committee received a presentation from Bruce Devitt, Vice-Chair of the 2012 Centennial Celebrations Committee, regarding the installation of a centennial memorial walkway in Memorial Park. As the southern portion of this park is a designated heritage site, any changes or additions to memorials, pathways, or landscape areas require a Heritage Alteration Permit.

The Committee discussed how a Heritage Alteration Permit should be processed and it was decided that a permit application should be prepared for consideration at the April meeting of the HAC and then forwarded to Council with a recommendation.

At the March meeting, Mr. Devitt outlined the Centennial Celebrations Committee's plans for a new memorial walkway. Individual pavers would replace the existing asphalt paths within the park; some would be inscribed and others would be left blank. The pavers in the vicinity of the cenotaph would be left blank so as not to compete with or detract from the existing memorials in this portion of the park.

Pavers in the paths radiating from the cenotaph and connecting with Esquimalt Road and Park Terrace would be inscribed with the names of pioneer families, those who served in the armed forces or otherwise contributed to the community, and loved ones. The names would be chosen by the persons purchasing the individual pavers. Inscribed pavers would continue to be sold after 2012 if space was still available.

The application from the Centennial Celebrations Committee, including a description of the walkway project and a sketch plan showing the location of the memorial walkway, is attached. Also enclosed is a draft Heritage Alteration Permit with an air photo of the site and a plan of the walkway.

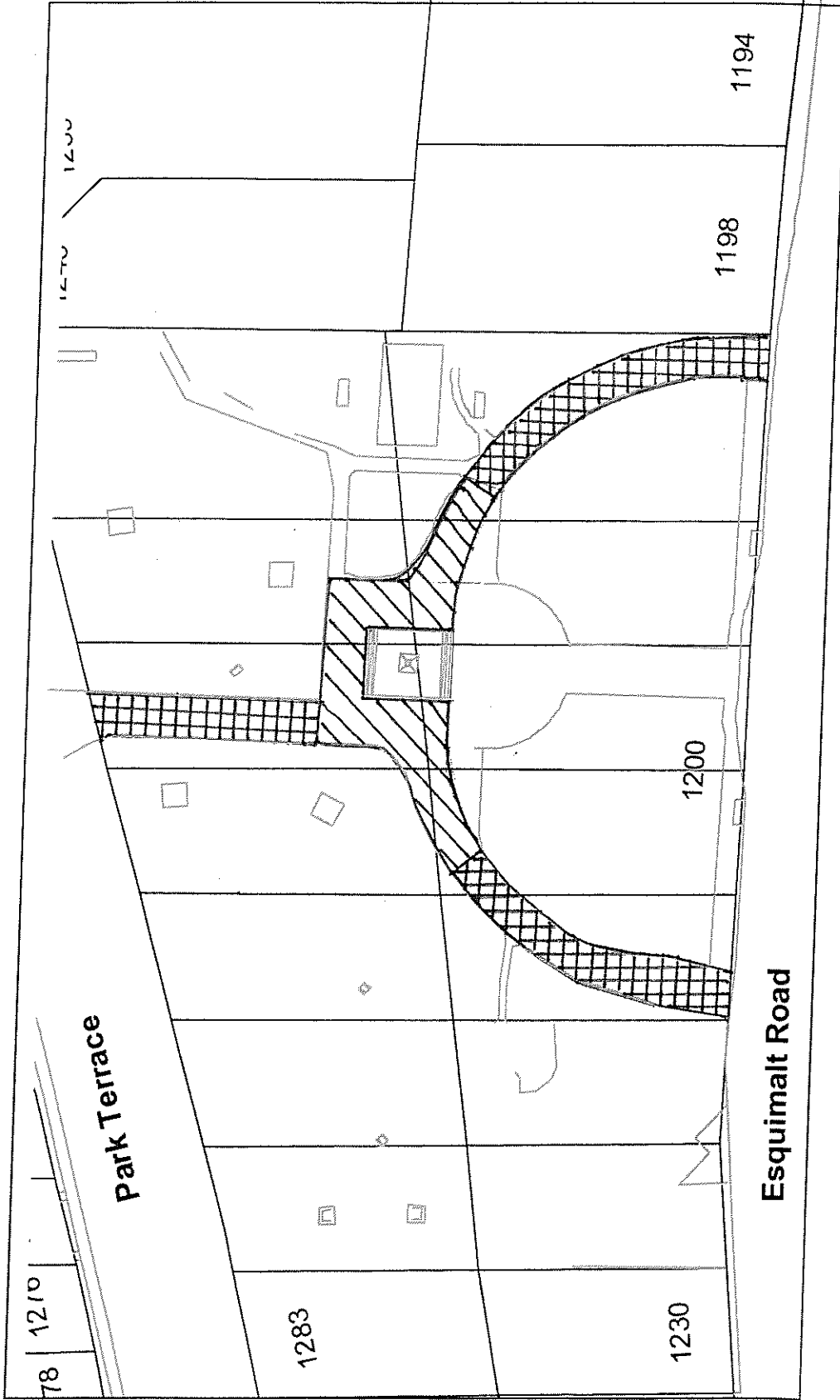

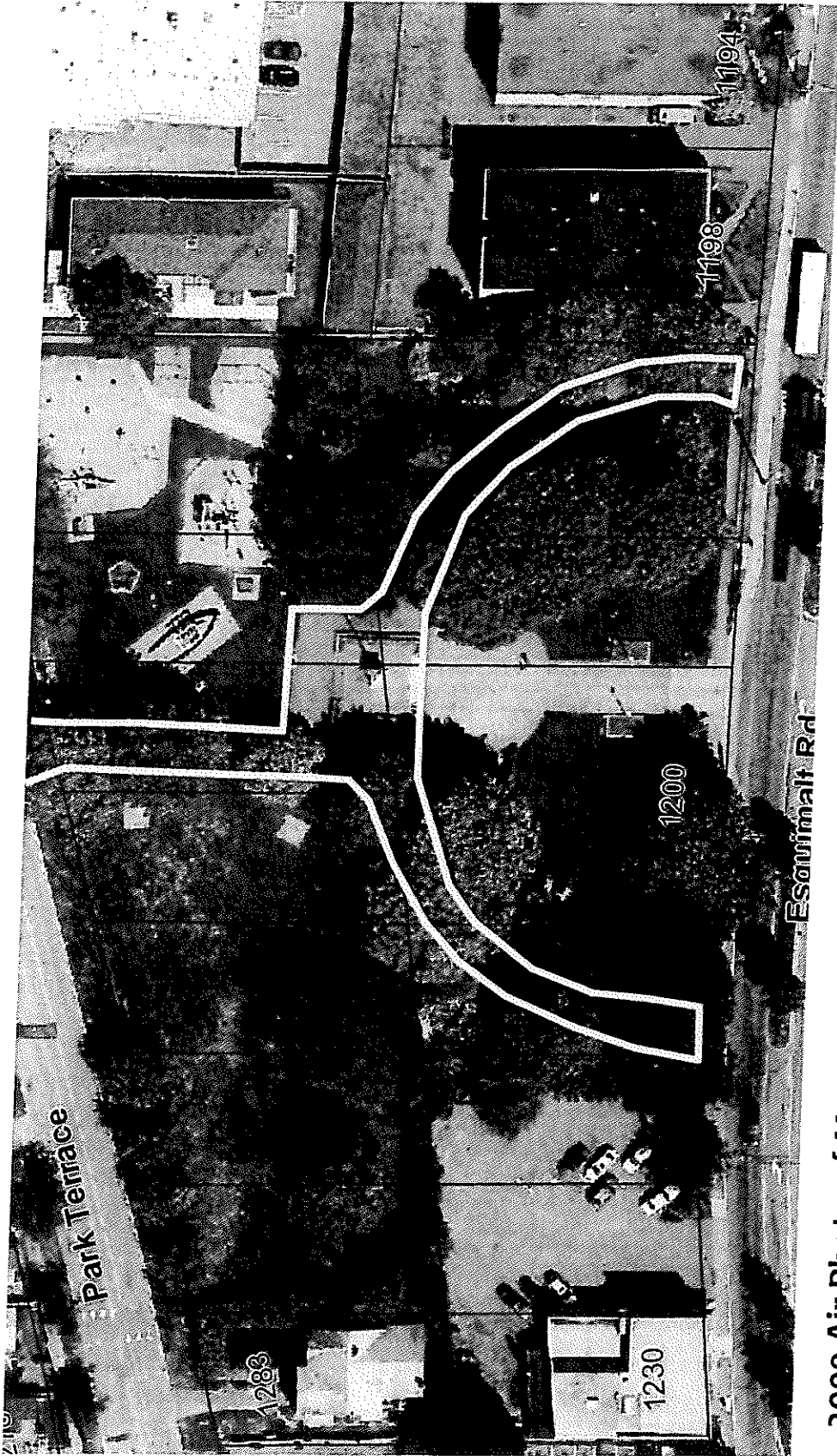

Bylaw 2210 s3: Heritage Alteration Permit request Council approval to create Esquimalt's 2012 Centennial Walk in Memorial Park.

The proposed walk way will replace the asphalt walk already in place (Schedule "A") leading to the cenotaph in Memorial Park (not including Legion Way). The condition of the asphalt walk is poor and the project will upgrade the walk with pavers that will be more suitable for the site.

Pavers will be installed in west, east and north sections of the walk as well as the rectangular asphalt area immediately adjacent to the west, east and north of the cenotaph (Schedule "B"). There will be no engraved pavers placed in this area adjacent to the cenotaph. The engraved pavers will be located in the west, east and north sections.

The centennial walkway will grow and develop over time and become a lasting memorial legacy of Esquimalt's past, its present and its future.

Accordingly the Heritage Alteration Permit should last for as long as it takes to complete the project.

BYLAW NO. 2210

A Bylaw to designate Memorial Park as a Heritage Site.

THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ESQUIMALT, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows;

1. This Bylaw may be cited as "HERITAGE DESIGNATION (MEMORIAL PARK) BYLAW, 1995, NO. 2210".
2. That certain parcel of land being known as Memorial Park, being and situate in the Township of Esquimalt and more particularly described as those parts of Lots 233, 234, 235, 236, 237, 238, 239, 243, 244, 245, 246, 248 and 249; Section 11, Esquimalt District, Plan 2854 shown cross-hatched on Schedule "A" attached hereto, shall be and is hereby provided Heritage designation pursuant to Section 1022 of the *Municipal Act*.
3. No person shall alter, remove or take action that would damage or change any landscape or man-made features located within the area designated by this bylaw without benefit of a heritage alteration permit approved by the Municipal Council.
4. Notwithstanding the provisions of Clause 3 above, the following activities may be carried out without benefit of a heritage alteration permit approved by the Municipal Council:
 - (1) general maintenance and upkeep of the landscaping features to provide for the continued good health of the plants. Such maintenance to include routine pruning, thinning, planting and replanting;
 - (2) general maintenance and upkeep of the man-made features. Such maintenance to include periodic repairs, cleaning and painting.



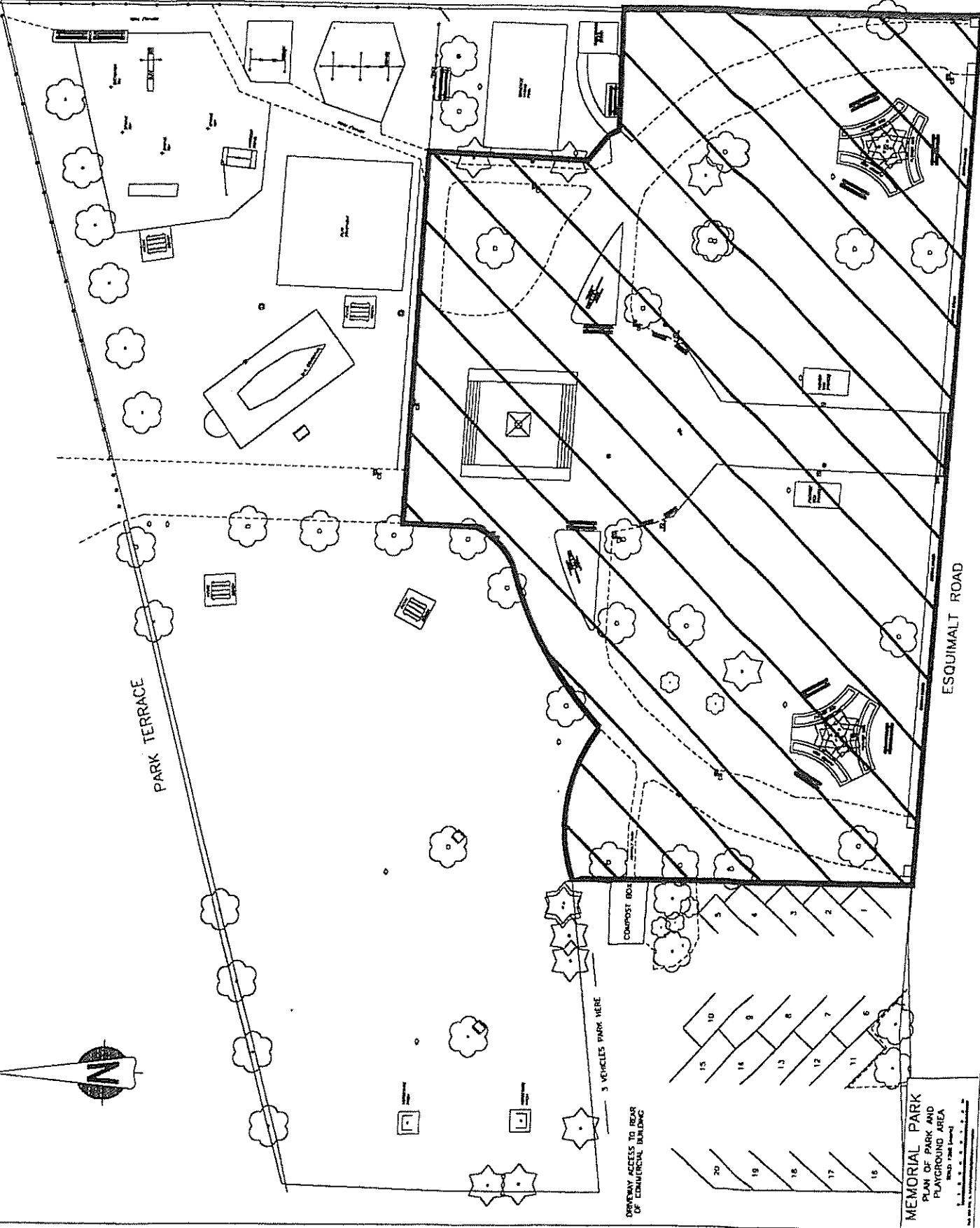

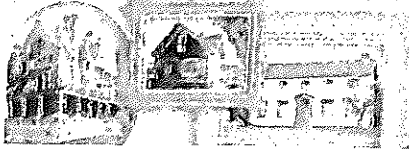
