An Impressive Sight: BCER Car #123



Street Car

This new "observation" car [sightseeing car] began service on the B.C. Electric Railway on 11 July 1909. Built in New Westminster, the car was referred to as a "Montreal" type and was described as having seats arranged in tiers, one rising above he other [as in a theatre] to give patrons an unobstructed view. Passengers would board at the rear of the car and enter the seating from a centre aisle. The designer of the car was a Mr. D.B. Blair.

The BCER constructed a "wye" at the Esquimalt Terminus in order that car #123 and other single ended trolleys could reverse direction.

This car made three 3-hour tours/day with the Takata Japanese gardens and the BCER Gorge Park as a destination.
