squimalt Fire Rescue took delivery of a new ladder fire truck in September and is currently conducting training exercises on the unit throughout the community. The truck—which replaces a 34-year-old Snorkel truck—is equipped with a 105 foot rear mount ladder and has a 2250 gallon per minute pump.

"This vehicle is very versatile and is a vast improvement over the Snorkel," said **Fire Chief David Ward**. "It has a higher reach, more power and water capacity, modern lockouts and safety features, and it can go below grade to perform over-the-bank rescues."

It is expected the truck will be operational in the coming weeks.

Community Volunteers Making a Difference:

Walk Fit Program a Success

The Walk Fit, Walk Faster Walking Clinic at Esquimalt Recreation has become a success with local residents, thanks in no small part to energetic and committed community volunteers.

"We wanted to build on the success of the TC 10K training clinics, but provide a program specifically for walkers," said Adult Programmer Melissa Wight. "Through one of our community volunteers, we were introduced to Helen Jaques, who has participated in every Times Colonist 10K as a walker since its inception, and now holds the role of Walk Coordinator for the 10K race." Helen, as an expert in walking and in race walking, has hosted many clinics and walking events in Victoria and readily agreed to help out.

The clinic was created in part from a grant through Walk BC, which provides funding to assist communities with the development, implementation and/or enhancement of introductory adult walking programs.

Community volunteers assisted Township staff in putting together the grant application, and jumped on board immediately once Esquimalt Recreation was notified that the grant application was successful. "I feel lucky to work in a community that has members who are so engaged, and ready and willing to help out with initiatives that they believe in," said Wight.

Two clinics have been held in the past several weeks with a total of 25 participants. "I want to thank our volunteer walk leaders: Susan Clamp, Debbie Tessier, Eleanor Calder, and Helen Jaques," said Wight. "And also to our program's guest speakers: Peter Goetsch from The Running Room, staff from the Esquimalt Pharmasave and LifeMark Health, and community member and motivator Keith Clamp."

Esquimalt is a Solar Community

Incentives Available, Including Draw Prizes of \$1000

The Township of
Esquimalt is one of
BC's newest Solar
Communities. The
designation comes
with \$5000 funding
to further develop
solar hot water programs
and projects in an effort to



promote clean energy and reduce the community's greenhouse gas emissions. The Township was selected through an RFP process which recognized the leadership role the municipality has demonstrated in promoting solar initiatives. Esquimalt's solar initiatives include a completed installation of a solar hot water system in its municipal hall, and opting-in to the Solar Hot Water Ready Regulation for all new single family homes under the BC Building Code.

As part of the SolarBC program, Esquimalt will be waiving the fee for solar hot water plumbing permits until December 31, 2010. Permitted solar hot water installations, started and completed between October 1st and December 31st, 2010, will be entered into a draw to win one of three SolarBC prizes of \$1000.

The prize is an additional bonus on top of SolarBC's \$2000 incentive for residential solar hot water installations. A typical solar hot water system costs \$6,900 before incentives, and is designed to last an average of 30 years. The first step for anyone considering installing a solar hot water system is to visit the SolarBC website, www.solarbc.ca. Want to learn more about solar hot water? A Voice for the Municipality

The Governments of Canada and British Columbia are in negotiations on the Te'mexw Treaty with five Coast Salish First Nations on Lower Vancouver Island. Local governments who may be impacted by this treaty have come together to identify and share their interests and concerns.

The local Te'mexw Treaty Advisory Committee (TAC) understands the need for the treaty process. Recognizing its impact on municipalities and the people who reside in them, the committee has been working since 2005 to have local interests heard.

The Township of Esquimalt, along with seven other municipalities, is represented on the committee, with Esquimalt Mayor Barb Desjardins sitting as the committee chair. The committee has developed an interest paper that identifies local government concerns and interests.

Free Registration of Secondary Suites Extended

If you're still thinking about registering your secondary suite and are worried that you missed the cut-off date for free registration, you'll be happy to know Council has extended the registration deadline to April 19th, 2011.

There are benefits to registering your suite including security for you and your tenants; the ability to properly insure your premises; and being able to use rental income from your suite to qualify for a mortgage.

In order to register your suite, you must apply for a building permit and arrange to have the suite inspected.
