

Wastewater Treatment Project update

Construction activities in Esquimalt remain on schedule for the Wastewater Treatment Project.

Construction to install the Residual Solids Conveyance Line under the Tillicum Bridge began October 15 and will take approximately 6-8 weeks to complete. Southbound traffic will be reduced by one lane from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and northbound traffic will not be impacted.

Construction crews are completing work for the Residual Solids Conveyance Line at Gore and Lyall streets, before moving to Dominion and Belton streets, then Craigflower and Arm streets, and lastly Tillicum Road.

The Macaulay Forcemain is

progressing with construction currently on Bewdley Ave. There remains local traffic only on this street as this work is completed. The Macaulay Point Pump Station will begin to construct the above-ground wood structure this fall.

McLoughlin Point Wastewater Treatment Plant is making significant progress with structural steel and concrete work continuing on site. The 1.9 km outfall pipe was successfully installed in the summer.

Storm drain maintenance

Prepare your home and property for winter rain and snow storms.

We advise that homeowners check gutters, downspouts and perimeter drains around their house to ensure everything is working properly, and free from debris.

The Township makes every effort to keep roadside catch basins clear. We ask residents to help by not depositing debris, leaves or garden trimmings on the road, and by preventing debris from accumulating against curbs, in gutters or catch basins.

Homeowner drainage checklist

Clear your gutters and downspouts of all leaves and debris. Ensure that they remain clear through the winter.

Have your drain system cleaned and repaired if necessary. Remember, drain tiles will plug over time with mud, silt or roots, and in some cases, may even fail due to age.

Ensure that any surface that drains, such as those located at the bottom of driveways and stair wells, are clear of mud and debris and remain clear through the winter.

Public input on multi-family housing

The Township of Esquimalt and Island Health are partnering on a project looking at the effect of housing design on the social wellbeing of residents.

Through this project, the Township will be developing policies and guidelines for developers to encourage and promote the inclusion of spaces designed to foster social interaction in multi-family housing.

We've held various rounds of engagement and the study results are posted on esquimalt.ca and have been reviewed by Council. Staff are now working on draft design guidelines and a social well-being checklist for multi-family buildings.

Latest round of engagement goes to Council

The latest round of public engagement seeking input on ideas for Esquimalt Gorge Park and Saxe Point Park is summarized in a report and is posted on Esquimalt.ca/engage.

Council received the report at the October 22 Committee of the Whole. The purpose of the presentation was not to make a decision about a specific project, but for council to review the report, ask questions and give direction on next steps.

At the meeting, Council reviewed the public input and continues to refine the development of plans for enhancements at Gorge Park and Saxe Point Park. Additionally, plans are being developed for the new Public Safety Building. A public engagement process for the possible downtown recreation facility enhancements are being planned for 2020. Stay tuned for more details.

Moving ahead on climate change

Council endorsed a Terms of Reference for the Climate Action Planning Project on October 22. The plan includes a goal for Esquimalt to become a 100% renewable community by 2050.

A climate emergency report will be delivered early in the new year and will recommend immediate steps for the municipality to cut GHG emissions.

In the longer term the project will include a combined community mitigation and adaptation plan as well as assess municipal facilities for potential energy savings. Staff will be preparing a request for proposals for consulting assistance with this project before the end of the year.

Reducing risk through tree maintenance

Do you have trees on your property? When is the last time you had them assessed by an arborist?

Trees are part of our natural assets and benefit from proper care. Failing to do so can be risky from both a financial and safety perspective. Proper tree care can improve the overall health, safety and stability of your trees. By investing in trees when they are young—through activities such as tree branch training—it is possible to reduce the occurrences of major structural defects that pose higher risks in mature trees. As trees are living organisms, their health, structure and vigor can change in a short time.

A certified arborist will look at things like the tree's structure and function of the

roots, trunk, scaffold branches and canopy as well as the tree's location relative to your home and street. Also, fall is a great time to perform pruning as trees are dormant.

The township has our public trees assessed in the same manner. We want to keep our trees healthy and public safe. For more information about trees in Esquimalt, go to esquimalt.ca/branchout.

Esquimalt Alert's primary role is to provide emergency notification information for tsunamis, earthquakes and other largescale events that will affect people in the

township.
