Create a lasting legacy with your personal dedication on a paving stone to be set into the walkway at Memorial Park. Individuals, businesses and organizations are invited to participate in the project and leave a special message for tomorrow. Your paving stone could honour:

- a departed loved one,
- your family,
- a special friend
- a community pioneer
- a current or historic business, or
- a community organization or sports team.

You can reserve your paver for the walkway by completing an application form. Application forms are available at Municipal Hall, 1229 Esquimalt Road and the Recreation Centre, 527 Fraser Street. You can also down-load the application form at www.esquimalt.ca/2012.

- One hundred dollars (\$100) will reserve a 4"x8" small brick with 3 lines of 18 characters per line.
- Two hundred dollars (\$200) will reserve a large 8"x8" brick with 4 lines of 18 characters per line.

A tax deductible receipt will be issued for the full amount of the brick.

All funds raised will go towards the maintenance of the walkway. Come often and take a walk down the Centennial Walkway to relive and enjoy the memories that you helped create. *For more information, please contact Eileen Abbott at 250-412-8513*
